Shot in Fight

Charles Ross, 23, 3010 State street, was shot three times by James Douglas, 2317 State street, in a fight over Mrs. Mary Hutchinson, whose address is also 2317 State street. The fight occurred in the street in front of 3012 State street. The wounded man was taken to Provident hospital. Douglas was arrested by the Cottage Grove avenue police and booked on a charge of assault to kill.

Dies From Wounds

James Thomas, 32, 3434 Dearborn street, who was recently shot by James H. Williams, police officer of the Cottage Grove avenue station, died at the Bridewell hospital Wednesday morning. At the time of the shooting, Thomas was arguing with his wife at 31st street and Cottage Grove avenue. Officer Williams ordered the two to go home, but instead of obeying Thomas called a gun and fired at the officer. Williams then shot Thomas in the groin. The officer was exonerated at the inquest held at the County morgue Thursday.
