PHILADELPHIA, May 29.--The second national music festival was held at the Academy of Music Saturday afternoon and evening. May 17. The program was truly an artistic one, and as in the previous arrangement last year, it was intended as an occasion for the bringing together of the

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R. Augustus Lawson, planist, was loudly applauded for his marvelous interpretation of selections from the works of Gluck-Brahams, Chopin, Moszowski, Each, Aresky and Coleridge-Taylor.

Elizabeth Sinkford Thornton as guest soloist was all that could be desired in a schoolgir!. She appeared with the Howard University Glee club, the work of which was loudly applauded and well received, their "Cavaller Song." "Ave Maria," "The Day Grows Old" and "Invictus" proving acceptable renditions. Roy Tibbs directed both the glee club and the musical arts group at the two performance, "The Swing." "A Legend." "Evry Time I Feel de Spirit," "Swing Along," "Ave Maria, Stella" and "The Three Kings" were well rendered by the Howardites.

The Fisk Jubilee Singers reveled in such jubilee numbers as "John, the Revelator," "I Want Two Wings." "Great Camp Meeting." "Nobody Knows de Trouble" and "Golden Slippers I'm Goin' to Wear"—all of which received the applause of the listeners.

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Marian Anderson, who is to sail shortly for Europe, where she will study and also appear in recital, was heard in MacDonald's "Come Thou Spirit of Night," Sir Roger Quitter's "Music When Soft Voices Die"; "Summer," and for the evening performance "Les Berceaux" by Faure, "Air de Lia" (from "Enfant Frodique") by DeBussy.

While the affair was not so well attended in the afternoon it was more than made up for at the evening performance, the attendance being almost evenly divided between patrons of both races.
