Leslie Pinckney Hill, principal of the State Normal school at Cheney, Pa., in delivering the university day address at the St. James Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon declared that tho present generation of flace students are too superficial "We must produce more students who know now to study." said air, Hill, "and we must have more intensive scholarship on the part of our students."
