groups in the interest of universal peace. Her talks were also broadcast from radio stations in every city through which she passed during her eleven months in America. To those who hoped that the World War would be the final method of disposing of international problems by means of war, much in the past five years has tended toward utter disillusionment. Armaments have increased, navies increased, national taxes attained unbearable burdens, nevertheless the idea of settling issues by pacific means has permeated a large portion of the world's population. This is especially true of the youth in America, which realizes that if a war comes in the future it will be their lot to carry it. They therefore consider that they should have a say in the direction of world affairs. Thus it is to the youth of the world that Miss Root has directed her lectures, speaking in universities everywhere.

Events foretold over seventy years ago by the founder of the Baha'i faith, Baha'u'llah, have actually come to pass in the last de-The present chaos everywhere apparent he indicated would be the result of the world's delay in taking the necessary steps to bring about the federation of mankind.

It is to make America realize that we are to take the lead in a new social order that Miss Root returns
