THE LATE MRS. CARRIE W. CLIFFORD Is the acknowledged founder of Ohio Federation of Colored Women's clubs. On her initiative she established "Queen's Gar-dens" the official organ of the Ohio club women and served as its first editor. Her labors re-flect great credit on Ohio's women, for in her day she was wise enough to see the value in organization, a public press and the strength that would come to the women of any state that was united with a national organization.

Her work at and for Wilberforce university, her alma mater, has taken her to all parts of this country and several times abroad lecturing and entertaining for the benefit of the school. Thousands of dollars have been raised in this way for the school. Her labors as a lecturer in the cause of temperance and her literary contributions have had wide acclaim. In the midst of all this she found time to serve as second president of Ohio and as the president of the National Association of Colored Women. She is the founder and national chairman of the Hallie Q. Brown national scholarship loan of the N. A. C. W.

MRS. LETHIA C. FLEMING Ohio's seventh president (Mrs. Della Fields being the sixth) has been a factor in the National Association of Colored Women for years. She is the wife of Thomas G. Fleming, ex-alderman of Cleve-land. In her own right Mrs. Fleming ranks high in the national field of civic, fraternal and political works. She is the second Ohio woman to be selected to lead the Race Republican women of the country. During her administration as president she divided Ohio into four districts. She is a member of the administrative board of the N. A. C. W.

organization was chartered. Mrs. Scott later bectme the president of the Central Association of Colored Women and later elected to the position of recording secretary of the National Association of Colored Women. She was appointed executive secretary of the N. A. C. W. and died at her post

Fifth president of the Ohio state federation accomplished much for her state during her administration. Besides her state program, Ohio raised more than \$1,-000 for the renovation of the Douglass home; "Queen's Gar-dens" was enlarged; a junior fed-eration was organized; \$2,107.00 was raised for the national scholarship loan fund. Wide contacts with other organizations were made. Mrs. Davis has served as secretary of the N. A. C. W. and is at present the secretary of the Central Association of Colored Women.
