15 Years Ago

AUGUSTA, Ga.—Hon. Judson W. Lyons, attorney and registrar of the United States treasury during the term of the lae President William McKinley, died at his home here. Until 1908 he was a power in politics in the Republican party of Georgia. In 1896, with Henry Lincoln Johnson, Lyons was a delegate to the St. Louis G.O.P. convention. At the recent Republican national convention in Cleveland he failed to put in his appearance and for the first time since 1880 he was missed. He succeeded Blanch: K. Bruce of Mississippi as registrar. Bruce died of illiness while in office. Lyons was educated at the old Augusta institute, now Morehouse college. of which his brother-in-law, John Hope, is president. In 1905 Lyons gave way to W. T. Vernon. He was admitted to the bar in Goorgia in 1884. He had made his home here since retirement.

HONOLULU, Hawaii—Nolle Reginald Smith, born in Cheyenne, Wyo., is making good as a business man and will enter politics here. He is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and came here in 1916. He is owner and manager of the American Contract and Draying company which hauls much fruit to the canneries. One contract with the Libby company guarantees him the hauling of 5,000 tons of pineapple. His offices are at 182 Halekaulla street.

10 Years Ago
