'School Won't Turn To Trades,' Hill

PHILADELPHIA, April 5—(ANP)
—Dr. Leslie Pinckney Hill, nationally known orator and president of the Cheyney State Teachers college, denied this week that his century old institution will be revamped and made into a trade school, after the Tuskegee pattern. Rumors to this effect were rampant for many days.

Months ago, a newspaper columnist hinted that what Pennsylvania needs is not a state teachers college, since its graduates cannot get jobs in Pennsylvania, but a trade school where skilled workers can be trained for the state's industries. It was proposed that the bulk of the state's support to Cheyney should be going to Downingtown industrial school which emphasizes trades.

Dr. Hill's denials were repeated by Joseph V. Baker, head of the division of Race research in the state department of labor and industry.
