

52 RACE WOMEN LAWYERS LISTED IN BAR JOURNAL

Fifty-two women are practicing lawyers in the U. S., of whom 60 per cent are self-supporting, with incomes ranging from \$1500 to \$4000 a year.

These statistics are furnished by Dr. Sadie T. M. Alexander, a mem-ber of the Philadelphia Bar, in a story on women lawyers in the initial publication of the National Bar Journal
