PANNING THE NEGRO PRESS is considered smart as hell by Negro intellectuals. This is pretty silly, chum. Whether the intellectuals like it or not, the Negro press is our first line of attack and our last line of defense.

Ted Poston wisely turned it down, and unless they stick to one of their second choices, the whole thing will blow up. The Negro press can really dish it out, but can it dish it out in concert, and can it take it?
