## World' Dinner Seeks Africa, U.S. Harmony

NEW YORK—Keynote address during the One World dinner of the African Academy of Arts and Research scheduled at the Capitol Hotel here, Nov. 22 will be delivered by Dr. Charlotte Hawkins Brown, founder-president of Palmer Institute, on the need for heringing Africa and America closbringing Africa and America closer together.

Dr. Brown will be followed by James P. Gifford, Columbia university law dean, on the program honoring K. Ozuomba Mbadiwe, retiring head of the academy, who will soon return to his native Africa, after seven years work here. Another important speaker is Dr.
A. B. Xuma, spokesman for eight
millon South African Negroes, who
arrived here recently to denounce
Prime Minister Jan Smuts attempt to annex more African territory. Dr. Xuma will receive a certificate of merit for his work in world race relations from the academy. Besides the speeches on exten-sion of world civil rights, and better international relations, the dinner will feature presentation of the Wendel' Willkie Memorial award to Ethiopian emperor Haile Selassie. Given for his contribu-tions to world peace it will be accepted by the emperor's proxy, Ambassador Ras H. S. Imru from James S. Watson, head of the Wilkle award committee.

United Nations' delegates from Liberia, Haiti, Russis, India and Egypt, have been invited to the dinner, theme of which is "Africa Looks Ahead."
