BAHAI-RELIGION-ART

Mrs. Jaleh Khadem (jah-LAY kah-DEM) of Evanston, a Persian Baha'i artist, will speak at the public meeting at the Baha'i House of Worship, Wilmette, at 3:45 p.m., on Sunday, April 13. Her topic will be on "Religion and Art."

A native of Tehran, Iran, she was reared and educated in Spain. Her paintings and sculptures have been exhibited both in the North Shore area and in Spain. She recently exhibited a number of three-dimensional plexiglass works in Tehran. As artist and traveler, Mrs. Khadem has been to most of the Middle East, Europe and North Africa. Earlier this year, she spent two months researching Iranian pre-Islamic art and the art of the Safavid period.

Mrs. Khadem will illustrate her talk with colored slides. Following the program, she will meet informally with visitors in a question-and-answer session. The program is one of the regular weekly series of lectures which follows the Sunday afternoon devotions at 3 o'clock in the auditorium of the Baha'i House of Worship. The public is invited.

A three-day interfaith conference on Abortion and Human Life convenes experts in medicine, law and sociology April 10-12 at Ramada Inn, Schiller Park (near O'Hare Airport). The sponsoring group is the National Commission on Human Life, Reproduction and Rhythm, who are conducting their Fourth International Symposium.

The keynote address, entitled "Reverence for Life," open to the general public, was given by Rev. Charles Carroll, Episcopalian Chaplain of the Medical Center of the University of California at San Francisco, Thursday, night, April 10, at 8 p.m., in the Regency Room of the Ramada Inn. The Reverend Carroll, who did his post graduate studies at Yale and Harvard Law Schools, is versed in both the legal and the moral aspects of the question of abortion.

Other participants in the symposium represent different geographical areas of the United States as well as other
