Olinga speaks to Bahais on world social, economic problem

Enoch Olinga, noted economist from Uganda, and author of the book, "Social and Economic Problems -Their Solution" was recently in Wilmette, Illinois as part of a world tour that he is making on behalf of the Baha'i Faith.

In the course of his journey he has already visited Bahai communities in Miami, Fla.; Nashville, Tenn.; Washington D. C.; and New York, N. Y. After his appearance in Wilmette he will continue on to Seattle, Wash. and then to various islands in the Pacific, several countries in South East Asia,

and finally to India, Pakistan, Iran, and Turkey. In 1952 Olinga Accepted the Baha'i Faith and spent the next eleven years teaching and spreading the Baha'i Faith throughout west Africa. In 1957 he was appointed a "Hand of The Cause of God." This is a selected group of Baha'is whose task is to teach the Baha'i Faith all over the world.

During each of his stops Olinga has reported on the rapid growth of the Baha'i Faith in South America, India, and Africa. He has also stressed the need for the American Baha'is to increase their efforts to inform others of the teachings of Baha'u'llah, the Prophet-Founder of the Baha'i Faith.

The Baha'i Faith originated in Persia (now Iran) in 1844. Baha'is believe that Baha'u'llah was the bearer of God's message to mankind for this age. The Baha'i Faith is now established in over 3,000 localities in the United States.
