Dear Harriet!

Today Our Beloved spoke on the efficacy of the Holy - Spirit. Man cannot attain to the highest summit of human progress without the assistance of the Breathers of the Holy - Spirit. A man intellectually may become enabled to educate a few, but general education is imparted to the world of humanity through the prophets of God, because they are the real Instructors of the human race. The foundation of civilization is the amelioration of the conditions of morality; the basis of spirituality is the purity of morality. The Everlasting Glory of the world of humanity is in the readjustment of morality. The power and the potency of man is through the refinement of morality. And the beautification and

and ~~refinement~~<sup>2</sup> of morality is possible except through the Breathes of the Holy Spirit. Therefore whosoever is confirmed with the Breathes of the Holy Spirit, he will be assisted to confer a general education. This is the difference between the influence of religion and philosophy.

2 In the morning Our Beloved sent several cablegrams to the friends in the Orient telling them the news of the Cause, because, <sup>nowadays</sup> he ~~could~~ <sup>was</sup> write Tablets ~~nowadays~~. He was too busy. After drinking tea in His Presence he came suddenly toward me and laughingly slapped four times on my cheeks. Ah! lately I have not been giving you your salary! He ~~strictly~~ struck with such force that for several hours afterwards I could feel "the ~~sweet~~ taste of it. One" always feel ~~so~~ much better after receiving one of his love-pats~~slap~~, but it so happened today that I received another one before the eyes of all the

friends. Of course they were very much amused and laughed. It was right after his <sup>public</sup> address. He was going around shaking hands with each one but as he passed by me, instead of shaking hand I received a nice <sup>hard blow</sup> ~~warm~~ <sup>hand</sup> slap. I assure you, it was a good one; one long to be remembered. Off Then a lady came to me and <sup>asked mischievously,</sup> said why did you not show your left cheek? I was amazed at her ~~question~~, I told her <sup>that</sup> my both cheeks <sup>were</sup> at the disposal of the Lord. He doeth whatever He willeth.

3 About <sup>at</sup> nine o'clock a very prominent Persian came and had a ~~long~~ interview with Our Beloved. He spoke with him about his ~~long~~ imprisonment and the many frustrated machinations of Sultan Abdul Hafiz against his life. The <sup>upshot of the</sup> result ~~was~~ always that he <sup>was</sup> now in Far's, teachings the principles of the Cause and Abdul Hafiz <sup>Pasha</sup>

was surrounded with  
~~is amidst~~ gloom and degradation. 4

4 Then four young Persians arrived. They were the graduates of the school of Tarbiat and <sup>had</sup> passed government examination ~~about~~ two years ago. Therefore they are <sup>now</sup> being educated at the expense of the government in the Persian Schools. One of these four students ~~is~~ Marja Ashraf, the brother of Ghodsa Khanom, who the Persian girl who is now studying in Mash.  
He ~~was~~ is a very fine young man, very dignified and refined in manner. The Master told them in part: - "I hope that ~~you~~ <sup>they</sup> will study well; that ~~you~~ <sup>they</sup> will acquire those sciences which will be useful to Persia on ~~your~~ <sup>their</sup> return. He wished them to <sup>trust</sup> ~~you~~ <sup>them</sup> would fit ~~yourself~~ <sup>themselves</sup> to be the ~~the~~ <sup>new</sup> pioneers of modern arts and sciences in Persia. The Persians in the past few ages have been

only destroying, setting back that glorious nation in the scale of civilization, but I hope you will build, ~~that they~~ <sup>the students</sup> will lay the solid foundation of true enlightenment. ~~You are~~ <sup>They were</sup> the young plant of the garden of hope, strive so that ~~you~~ <sup>they</sup> may grow and develop and adorn the trees of your lives with delicious fruit. After this address the Master went out with Monsieur Dreyfus and the fair Persian Students to have lunch with us.

Our Beloved returned at about 4 o'clock. While all of us <sup>were</sup> were in the large Salou, drinking tea and speaking on all manner of things, the Master opened the door and came in. He spoke with us for a little while and then retired <sup>down</sup> this room.

At six o'clock the students desired to leave for their school so the Master called them to His Presence and said : -

I<sup>He</sup> was made very happy to meet ~~you~~<sup>them</sup>. I hoped the trees of ~~your~~<sup>their</sup> existences may bring many fruits. Some of the young Persons who come <sup>to Persia</sup> here learn only the rules of civilization. How ~~you~~ must show them otherwise. May ~~you~~<sup>they</sup> study in such wise as to confer life upon Persia. May ~~you~~<sup>the</sup> be conducive to the promotion of the Cause of God! May ~~you~~<sup>they</sup> ameliorate the moral conditions of the nation! May ~~you~~<sup>they</sup> promote sanctity and holiness amongst the people! May ~~you~~<sup>they</sup> give impetus to progress, to agriculture, to commerce and arts.

5 About ~~six~~<sup>seven</sup>, <sup>the</sup> Master took me for a short walk. A mother with the utmost of tenderness was carrying a child in her arms. Our Beloved looked

looked at the child and said: - Children  
 give to a person the greatest consolation,  
 no matter how much the father is  
 sad or cross, as soon as his darling  
 child laughs or speaks, he ~~is~~ is made  
 happy. One who has had children  
 has gone through a certain joyous  
 experience that is impossible to  
 describe in word! It is an indescribable  
 state, a divine condition full of sweetness  
 and love. ~~I~~ had a son about 3 or 4  
 yrs old. This child was a great comfort  
~~to me~~ to ~~me~~. Often, past midnight while  
~~I~~ was sound sleep, the child would  
 leave his small bed and slowly  
 creep in ~~towards me~~ ~~his~~ and ~~designed~~  
 little arms around ~~my~~ <sup>his</sup> neck, and  
 kiss ~~my~~ <sup>his</sup> closed eyelids and face. Then  
~~I~~ would wake and unclear and  
 cover it. That state - that happiness  
 that beautiful joy - that is to wake  
 up and find your beloved child  
 clasping his tiny arms around  
 your ~~neck~~ <sup>that</sup> ~~neck~~ - is only known to  
 a father.

*Interpretation: Mr. Ahmad Shahzad*

Mrs Henley- You sent word to me through Isabel Fraser that you desired for me a high state of spirituality. Will you please explain to me just what is meant by that and how one can attain unto it?

The Master- By attaching no importance to material things. According to the laws which bind us to this planet, everyone is tied to the gratification of self, to ~~neant~~ the satisfying of desires. What I ~~want~~ for you is that you may be freed - that you may become the embodiment of spirit - that you may become an angel.

*Mrs H.* - But for me detachment is difficult. I desire to make for myself a name in the theatrical world. How can one attain to ~~the~~ state ~~in~~ the theatrical world?

The Master- Even the theatrical world would not prevent you from becoming what I desire you to become. You can engage in work of an uplifting kind - the kind that will tend to lift one out of the sense world into the world of ~~morality~~, not ~~the~~ the kind that ~~are~~ degrading. Strive for that which prompts ~~you to~~ the personification of ~~art~~ dignity and ~~virtue~~. The theatrical world need not prevent your development.
