DAILY ACCOUNT OF THE LIFE OF

ABDUL BAHA

OF MIRZA AHMAD SOHRAB

APRIL 26th to SEPTEMBER 13, 1914

INTRODUCTION

In this series there are eleven Volumes.

The first nine Volumes, containing the original letters written by Mirza Ahmad Sohrab recording the daily account of the life of Abdul Baha, begins with December 5, 1912 and ends June 25, 1915. These are the daily records of what was going on around Abdul Baha, his talks, remarks and description of the life of the Bahais in Europe and in the Near East.

- 1. The letters covering the first seven months were mailed day by day to Miss Harriet Magee in New York City. These were read in the Bahai Assembly and copies were made and distributed among the Bahais of the United States and Canada.
- 2. The second portion of the diary letters up to the beginning of the first World War were mailed to Mr. Joseph Hannen of Washington, D. C. Mr. and Mrs. Hannen and other volunteer workers made extensive copies of these diary letters and shared them with the Bahai Assemblies in the United States and Canada.
- 3. The last portion of these diary letters, which covered the early stages of the first World War, were kept in Palestine and have neither been copied nor published. From June 25, 1915 to the end of the first World War the diary letters were kept in the Persian language and can be found in another series of volumes of manuscripts.

These letters were very generally and widely distributed among the Bahais in the East and West. Some of the Bahais made collections of them in typewritten and mimeographed forms; extracts of these diary letters were published in the "Star of the West;" a Bahai, Mrs. Mary Rabb, of California made a collection of extracts which were published serially in the "Star of the West" and later in a book under the title "The Divine Art of Living." These diary letters exerted an influence on the thoughts and lives of the early Bahais and they form an inestimable document portraying the thoughts and the life of Abdul Baha toward the end of his life.

It is unavoidable that, in this vast collection of documents and in mailing them from Palestine to the United States and in having carried them from one place to another in the past many, many years, some copies have been lost.

(a) 8 pages of the letter of Jan. 21, 1913 are missing; (b) letters from Sept. 14th to Oct. 9, 1914 are missing; (c) letters from Jan. 17th to Jan. 27th, 1915 are missing; (d) the letter of June 14, 1915 is incompleted; (e) from June 5th to June 21, 1915 the letters are missing; (f) the last letter dated June 25, 1915 starts with one line and then stops.

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Volume X contains samples of the typewritten and mimeographed copies of these diary letters as they were distributed in the early days. In the same volume there is a miscellaneous collection of various Bahai documents from 1901 to 1927.

Volume XI is a continuation of Volume X, giving more examples of typewritten and mimeographed copies of the diary letters.

Bahai Nest Mount Carmel, Haife, Syria April 26th 1914

Dear friends!

More than sweeks ago a cablegram from Mes Lia. Getsinger conveyed the following message: "Invitation from Maharaji. Going today. Explicate Confirmations. Lia."

Her latest letters describe her warm reception and her spiritual work by and amongst her nobb guests. God has greatly blessed her in her efforts in India and the fruits of her faittful labor are not only apparent to day but will become a hundred fold in the future. In one of her letters she writes the following touching prayer;

"O my God! I pray Thee send about Bala to India very soon. C Let this land behold the Light of His Face. Cause this country to be quietened by his Life-giving Personality and open the eyes of this presple to all effulgent Tlory of His Divine Reality. Our hearts are longing for Him! Our souls are princing for Him!

In his talk to the believers last night he said: - "The influence of the word of God is all-penetrative. One must simply arise and engage in the Service of the Cause. A letter is received today from Lua. There was a very important Personage that Lua

desired to meet and speak with him about the Cause. She would have been glad, even if she could see him accidentally for a few minutes. Hearing that this particular gentleman was going to sail for Europe she was willing to risk all and embark on the same steamer in the hope of seeing and speaking with him, One day just as unexpectedly she received a telegram from him inviting her to be heguest. Lua starts immediately with another Loroastrian moman, Doulat. arriving at the station she finds the automobile of that personage is waiting for her, He received her graciously and in the evening gives a reception in her honor. The next day she sends again his automobile with the message that as long as she istags he will have the pleasure to entertain her every night. From an autward standpoint it looked quite inpossible for Lua to meet this Gersonage but through the Confirmations of God it was realized. Sousheyanss has come and instead of unifying only Fersia, He is the Unifier of mankind, The Parsee community must greatly rejoice, for their Promised One hath come. The Orb of Tersia & success and greatness is slowly rising the Glory of the King of Kings is vouchsafed to theme.

Sheik ali akker of Thoutehow, a learned teacher of the Course asked, then, a number of theological questions which have always disturbed the minds of the eastern metaphysicious, and the Inaster withered such conclusive and clear answers as to satisfy the troubled hearts.

The master is trying to reduce the number of the Oriental pilgrins. But hardly a party leaves before another party takes its place. He has reiterated his former command that no pilgrim must leave his eastern home without at first receiving permission. In three or four days must every one will leave and the Pilgrinis Home smay enjoy a haliday for a few days.
